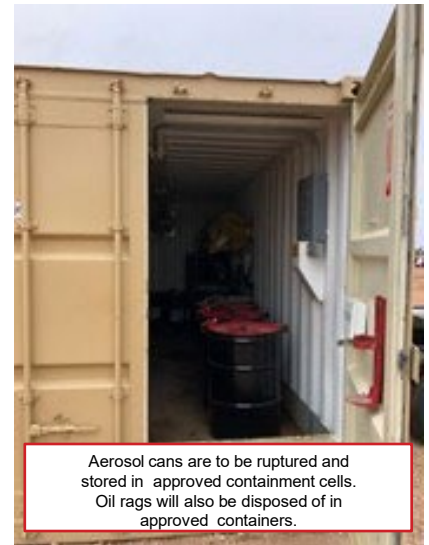


Waste Management

Extreme housekeeping is key to limiting and preventing environmental risks in the work area. A critical part of housekeeping is having a designated area to dispose of waste. Each project will designate specific areas to dispose of construction waste, hazardous waste (including spills), aerosol waste, general waste, and recycling. Front line supervisors are expected to inspect the designated area to ensure all waste materials are sufficiently contained in the storage containers and no cross contamination has occurred. Some job sites will have specific governing ordinances which require fences or bin coverings, but it is good practice to cover waste bins and have a secondary protective area to ensure no loose material accidentally blows out of the bins.



Other Frequent Construction Waste

Portable Toilets: Ensure portable toilets have easy access for “users” and the vendor to service. Avoid moving latrine with equipment as this could result in a spill.

Encourage vendor to secure the latrine with stakes or heavy sandbags to avoid tipping over. If necessary, ask vendor to improve the latrine security.

Concrete Washouts: Never wash concrete onto the grade. Use a washout to clean trucks, hand tools, and testing equipment. When washouts reach 75% capacity, schedule them for replacement and proper disposal. The FLS is expected to inspect these washouts before and after use to ensure follow on concrete pours will not be impacted.
